YOU AND THE ARTS

Give us a sense about your relationship with the arts.

As a stressed out law student at Texas Tech University School of Law, who was also struggling with my sexuality during that time, I found an emotional outlet through writing fiction pieces, and I have always gravitated towards literary arts. I'm particularly excited to see The Writer's Garret come to life in Oak Cliff (D1) and am financially supporting that organization.

Over my last two terms as Councilmember for District 1, I have fought for more funding for library programming, enhanced programming during the COVID-19 pandemic for the OC3, and funding for the Bishop Arts Theater, all of which I secured by negotiating with other Councilmembers.

In Oak Cliff, my children regularly participate in arts and crafts programming sponsored by the Dallas Library in conjunction with OCA), and by local programming by Color Me Empowered and Oil & Cotton. I will continue to support the arts if elected to my next term.

ADVOCACY

The non-profit arts and culture sector plays a big role in the Dallas economy. The most recent study showed almost a \$1 billion economic impact, supporting 33,000 jobs, driving cultural tourism, attracting relocations and talent, boosting education outcomes, and improving the quality of life across Dallas. Given this wide impact, we hope our elected leaders will help advocate for this sector.

- What role do you envision for yourself as an elected Dallas leader when it comes to the arts?
- Where will arts and culture fit within your priorities?
- Will you help ensure that arts and cultural issues continue to be included in the City's legislative agenda for Austin and Washington?

Historically, arts & cultural programming have been the first item cut in the City's budget when cuts are called for. This is unacceptable. The lack of access to culture and arts, particularly in marginalized communities, contributes towards the drivers of poverty. All parts of the city should have equitable access to the arts, and I will continue to be a vocal advocate.



2024 BOND PROGRAM
The City of Dallas owns 19 cultural venues and centers. The <u>needs inventory</u> for maintenance and

repairs on these facilities is projected to grow \$32M - from \$89M in 2017 to \$120M by 2024. Yet the bond office's proposal is only for \$15M. It's a cultural pot hole that is only getting bigger and bigger. These are venues that generate tax revenues, support jobs, and draw cultural tourism – IF you keep them maintained.

• Do you feel cultural facilities should be a part of the 2024 Bond Programs?

- If not, how would you work to get the needs inventory reduced and heading in a positive direction?
- If so, would you work to ensure the 2024 Bond Program includes cultural facilities at a significant level?

When I served on the 2017 Bond Task Force, we were informed by the City Management that the arts community was not receiving significant funds during that year, but would be a "priority" in the "next" be The next bond is here, and our cultural facilities should be among the top priorities.						

ARTS FUNDING

To help achieve a more equitable distribution of cultural resources, the City now uses a hybrid mix of funding from both the General Fund and a growing portion of the Hotel Occupancy Tax (on track to reach 15% by 2027.) This mix allows for a wide range of programs, from arts education to exhibitions and performances, individual artists and arts organizations, and more.


